Events & Activities

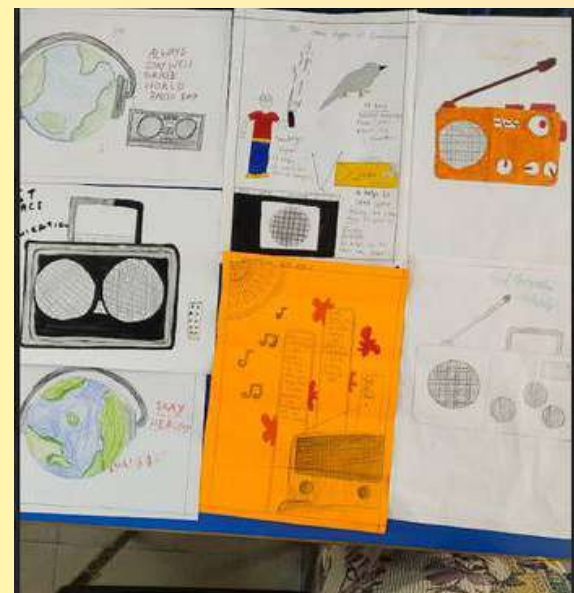


World Radio Day

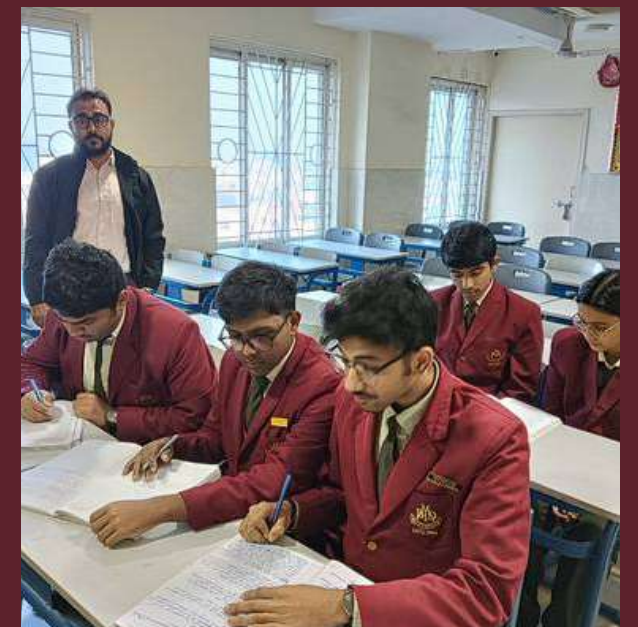
CBSE Grade XII Cost Accounting practical examination for the session 2025–26 was conducted on 27th January 2026 at B.D.M. International School.

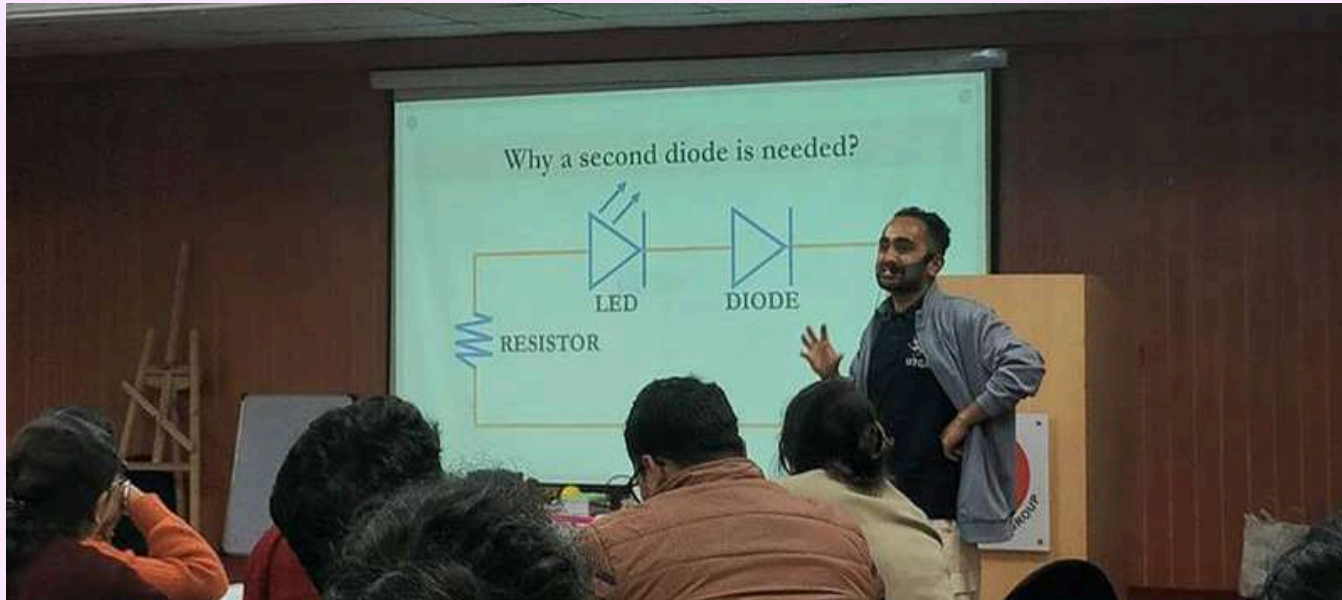

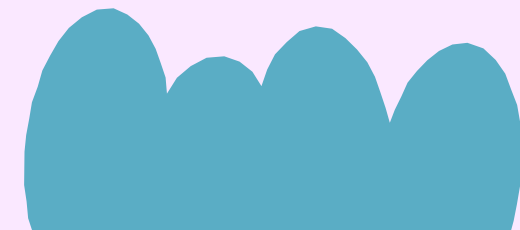
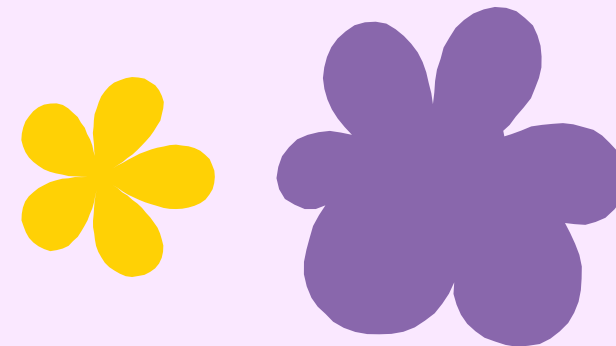
Experiential Learning

Nearly 250 students of Grades VII and VIII have been a part of this interactive session. The session was conducted by the Upper Primary counselor, Ms. Anisha Karmakar. It included discussions, presentations and practical examples, followed by a question-and-answer session.

The session primarily focused on understanding the difference between “Reel vs Real” and how games like Truth or Dare can sometimes cross safe and healthy boundaries. It explained how peer pressure can push students into uncomfortable or harmful situations, even when it feels like “just a game.” The session highlighted the emotional, mental and social effects of such dares and why saying ‘no’ is not a weakness. Students were encouraged to reflect on their choices, personal values and self-respect. The key message was to choose themselves over the game and make decisions that will protect their well-being and safety.



Interactive Session On Peer Pressure

On 10th February 2026, a workshop titled Thriving with ADHD: Conference on A.D.H.D was organised at Manovikas Kendra. The session was attended by the Upper Primary Special Educator of B.D.M. International, Ms. Ananya Samanta. The panel comprised distinguished experts including Prof. Partha Majumder, Ms Sonal Singh, Dr. Mahasweta Chatterjee, Ms. Nimisha Goenka, Ms. Tina Servaia, Dr. Suddhendu Chakraborty, Ms. Sudeshna Maitra Nag, Dr. Sohini Chakraborty, and Dr. Subham Sabherwal.

The workshop provided an in-depth understanding of the prevalence of A.D.H.D and its associated risk factors. It highlighted the importance of developing a shared understanding of the condition, discussed recent research developments, and explored the role of neurofeedback therapy in A.D.H.D management. The experts also addressed common myths and misconceptions surrounding A.D.H.D. The conference concluded with a panel discussion that examined approaches beyond conventional treatment methods. The session was conducted by experienced professionals, including psychologists, psychiatrists, and A.D.H.D coaches, making it an informative and insightful learning experience.

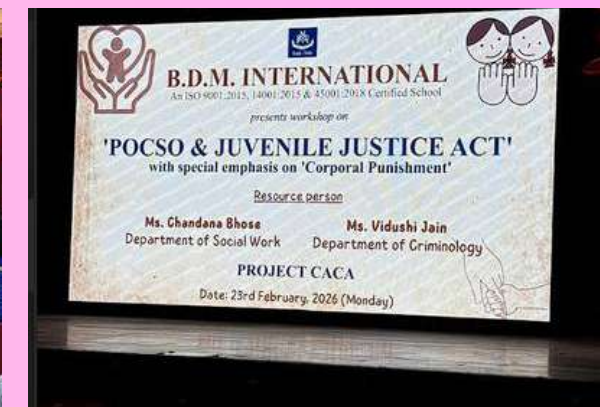
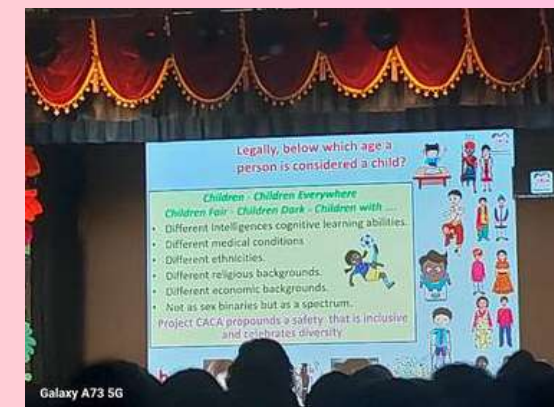
Capacity Building Programme

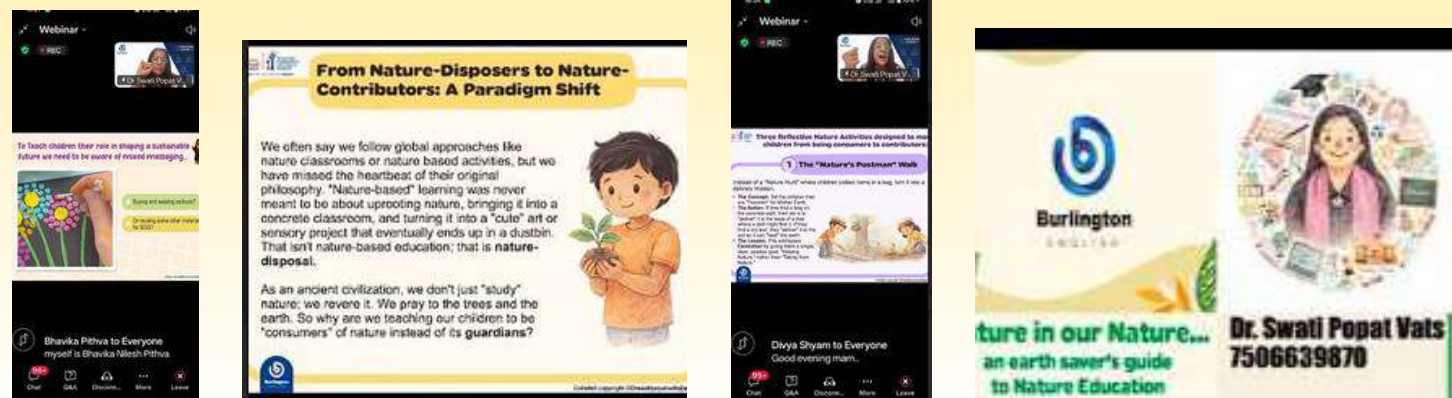
Workshop On Innovative Teaching Of Science & Social Science

Nature Education Curriculum— Workshop By Burlington

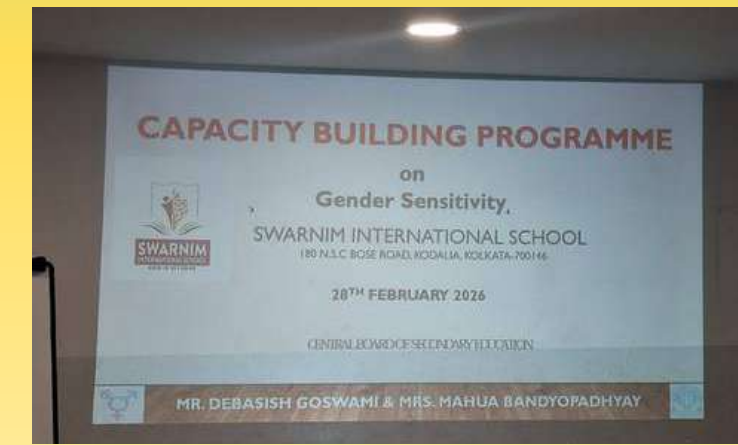

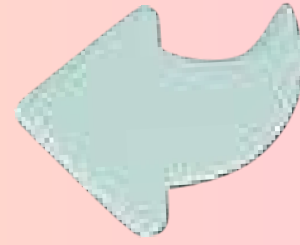
CBP Workshop On Gender Sensitivity In Schools

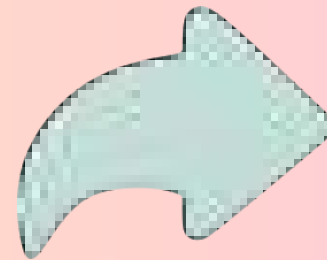
The programme promoted greater awareness, respect, and inclusivity within the school environment.

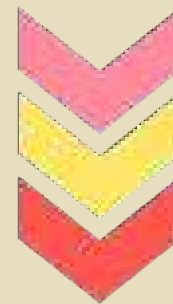
UCMAYPSE Yogasana Sports World Cup 2025

Building Resilience in the Children of Today

In an increasingly fast-paced and unpredictable world, resilience has become one of the most important life skills a child needs to develop. Resilience refers to the ability to cope with challenges, adapt to change, and recover from setbacks with confidence and strength. Children growing up today faces challenges at every turn namely academic pressure, digital distractions, social expectations, and global uncertainties. 
One of the primary foundations of resilience is a strong sense of emotional security. Children who feel loved, valued, and supported at home and at school develop the confidence to face adversity. Positive relationships with parents, teachers, and peers create a safety net that reassures them that they are not alone in their struggles. When adults listen patiently to a child's concerns and validate their feelings, the child learns that emotions can be expressed and managed in healthy ways.

Encouraging independence and problem-solving is another important step in nurturing resilience. It is often noted that parents try and shield their children from any impending adversity or try and solve their problems for them. In the process they manage to handicap their children of independent problem-solving skills. Allowing children to attempt solutions on their own—while offering guidance when needed—helps them build confidence in their abilities. When they realise that they can navigate difficulties independently, their self-belief strengthens.

Teaching children a growth mindset is another way of building resilience. When children understand that abilities can improve through effort and practice, they become more willing to take risks and try again after failure. Praising effort rather than only outcomes reinforce the idea that persistence is more valuable than immediate success. This enables children to look at challenges as stepping stones rather than obstacles.

Children are emotional beings and they need guidance in the expression of their emotions. Helping children to develop emotional regulation is another significant factor in building resilience. Teaching them simple techniques such as taking deep breaths, talking about their feelings, or taking short breaks during stressful situations can help them manage anxiety and frustration. Activities like sports, music, art, dance and theatre also provide constructive outlets for expression while building discipline and teamwork. In today's digital age, resilience also involves helping children cope with the pressures of social media and constant comparison. Guiding them to maintain a healthy balance between screen time and real-world interactions is crucial. Encouraging outdoor play, hobbies, and meaningful conversations helps children develop stronger interpersonal skills and a sense of self beyond online validation.

Schools play a vital role in fostering resilience by creating environments where mistakes are treated as part of learning rather than reasons for embarrassment. When teachers encourage participation, celebrate effort, and cultivate empathy among students, classrooms become safe spaces where children feel comfortable trying, failing, and trying again.

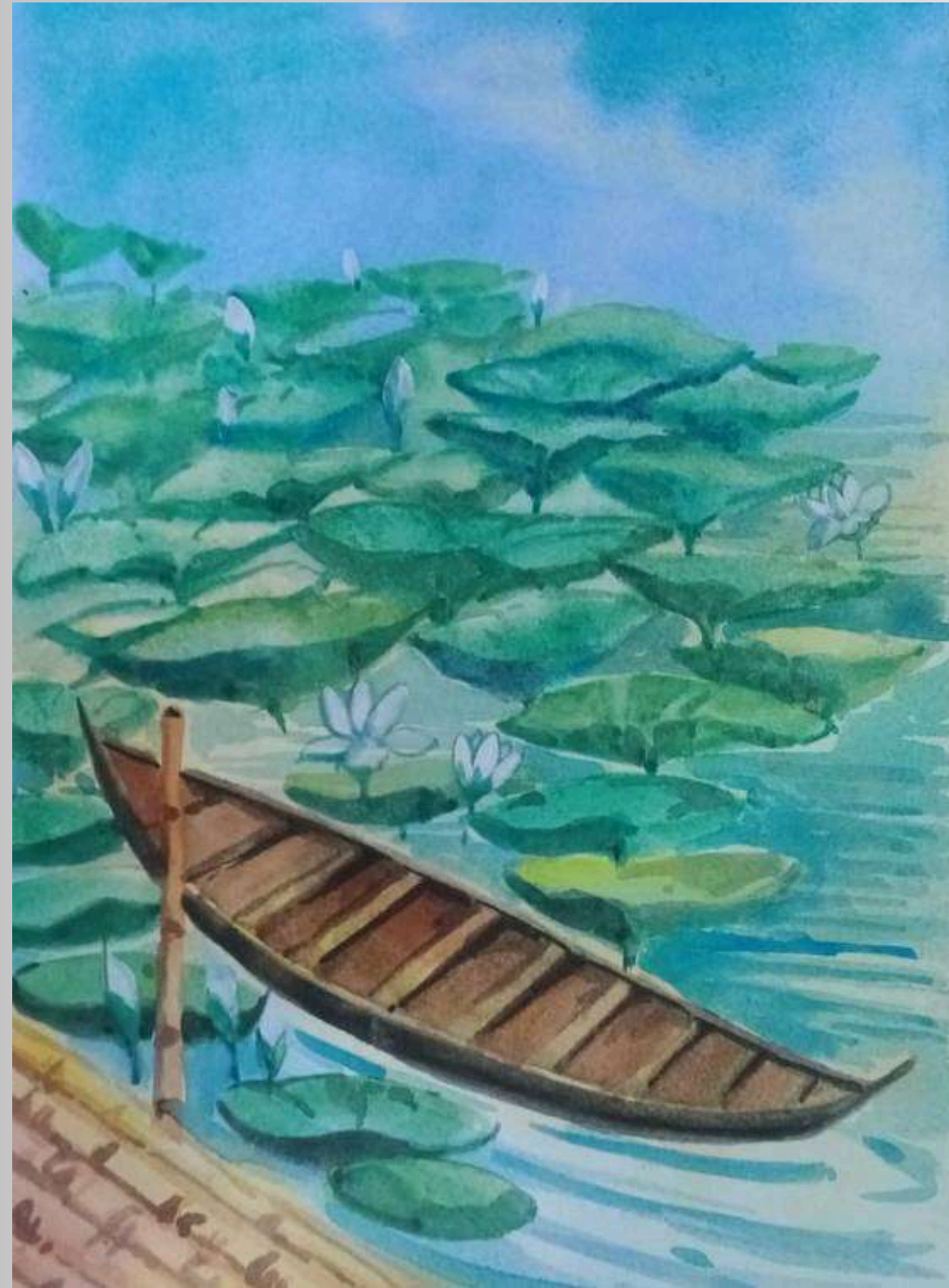
Teachers also act as role models of resilience. When educators demonstrate patience, adaptability, and a positive approach to challenges, students learn by observation. A teacher who remains calm during difficulties, admits mistakes, and shows determination in solving problems conveys a powerful message about handling setbacks with dignity and optimism. Teachers who identify and nurture individual talents—whether in academics, sports, arts, or leadership—help students build a strong sense of self-worth. This will enable children to face the present with courage and prepare themselves to become adaptable, compassionate, and confident individuals who can shape the future with strength and optimism.

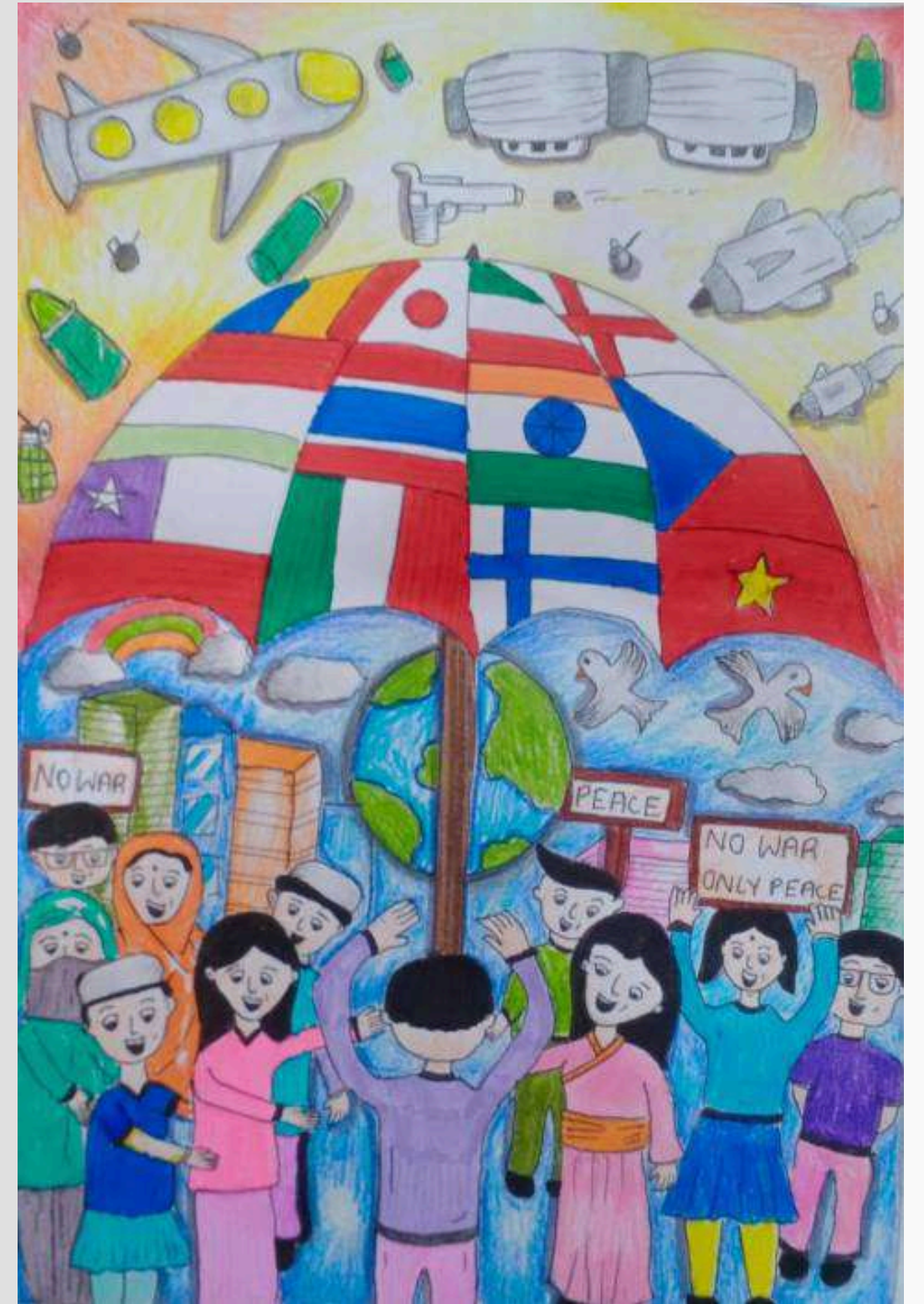

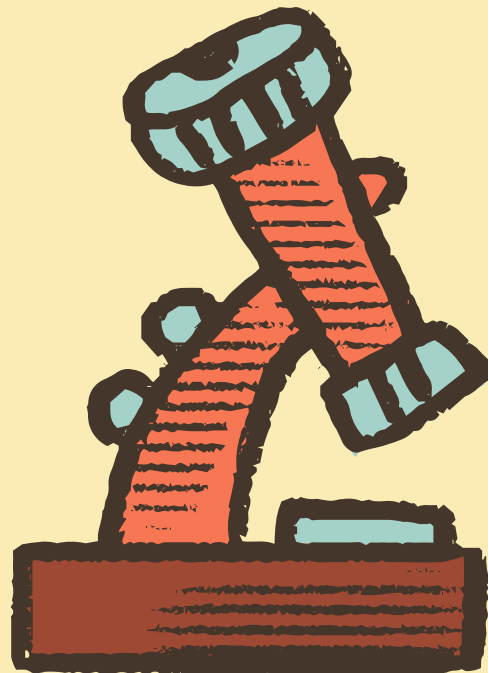
After 4 years of hard work, their creation finally came to life. It was called LX-14.

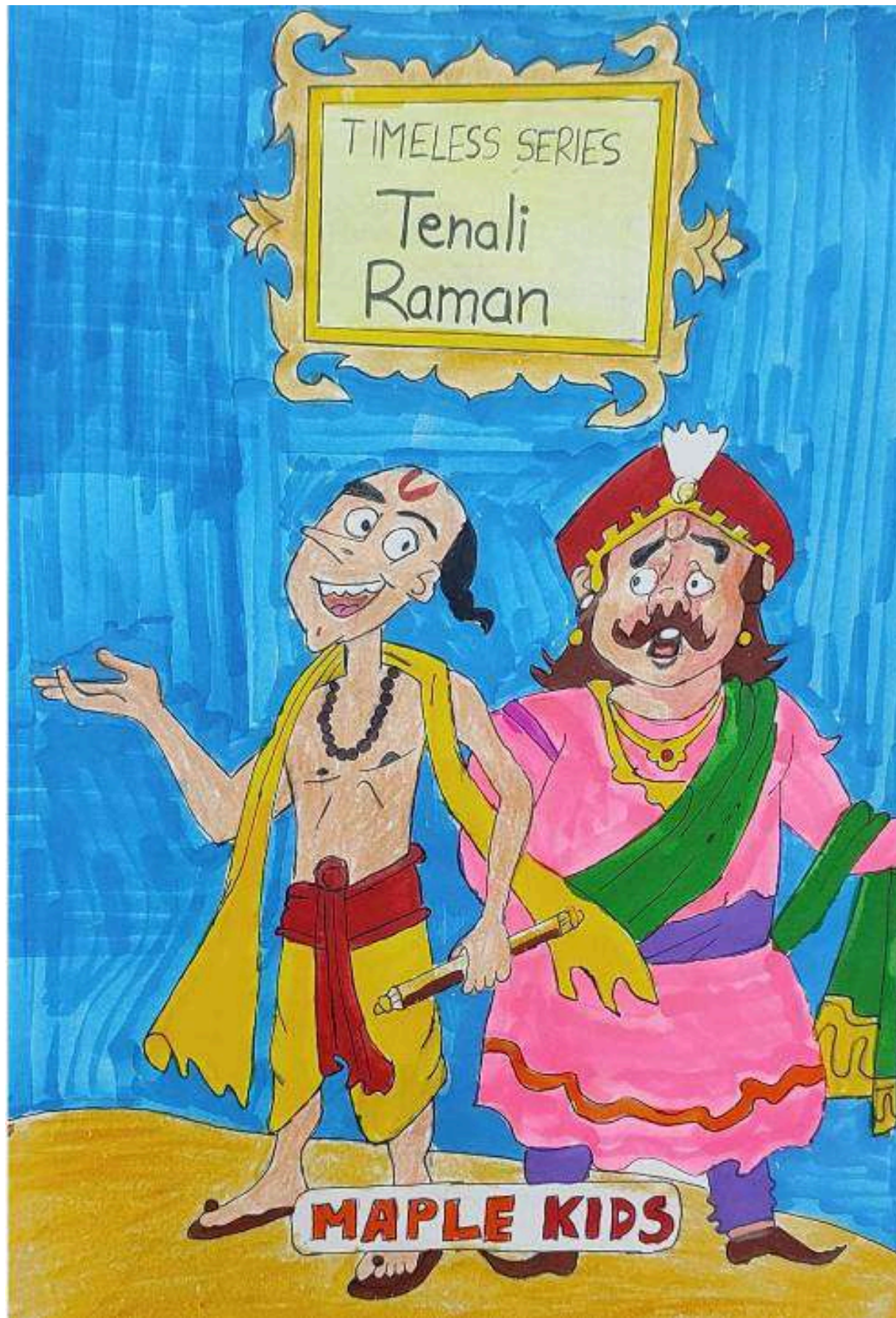

I know that being a teacher is the best job in the world. As Nelson Mandela once said: "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." At the end of every day, I look at the empty desks and smile, thinking of the children I love so much. I don't just teach English and Social Science; I teach the future, and my heart is full because of every single one of you.

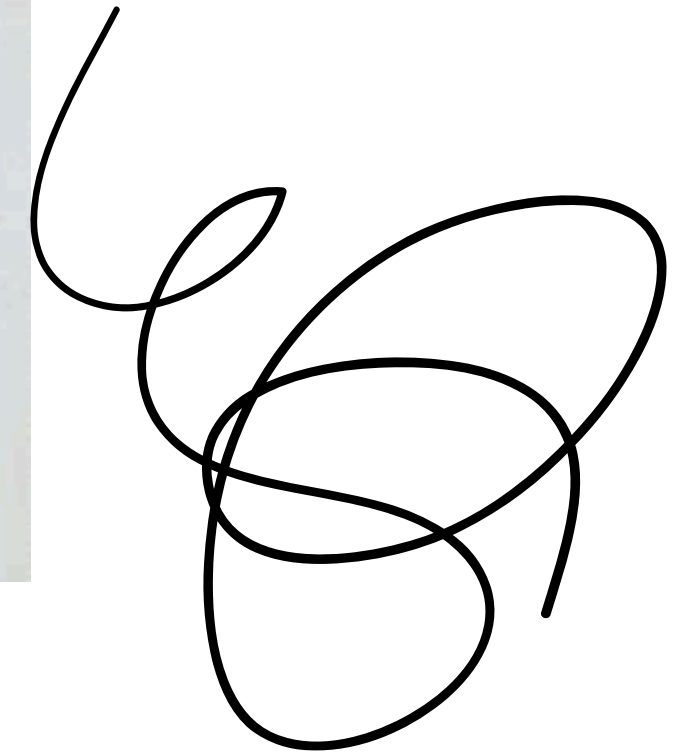
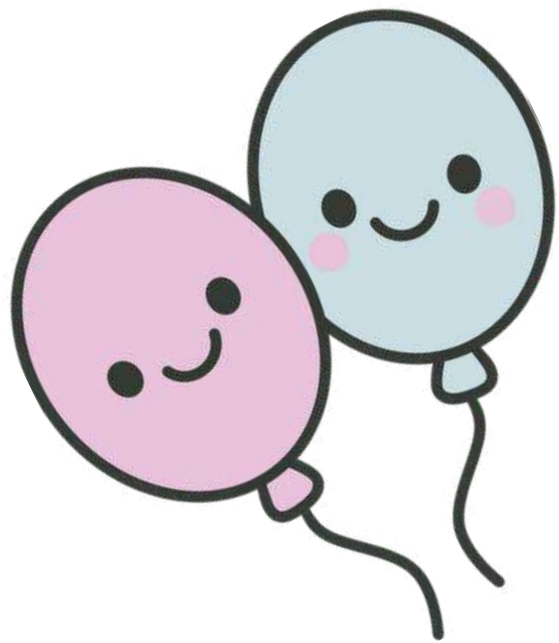

"Where have you come from?" he asked.

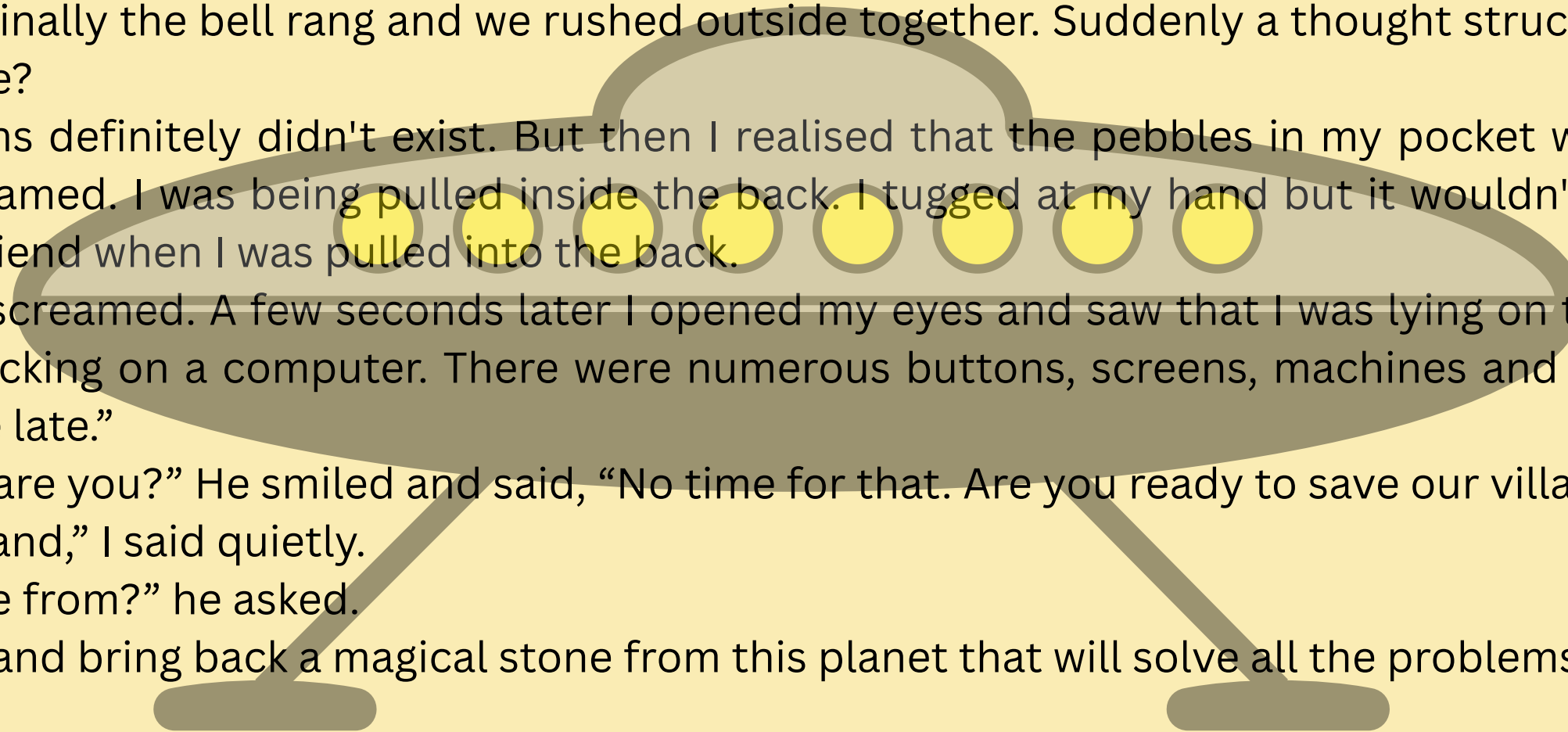
"I have to go to space and bring back a magical stone from this planet that will solve all the problems of the people of this village."

I gave him the stone and he went away. The next thing I knew was that it was raining heavily and there were shouts of joy all around.

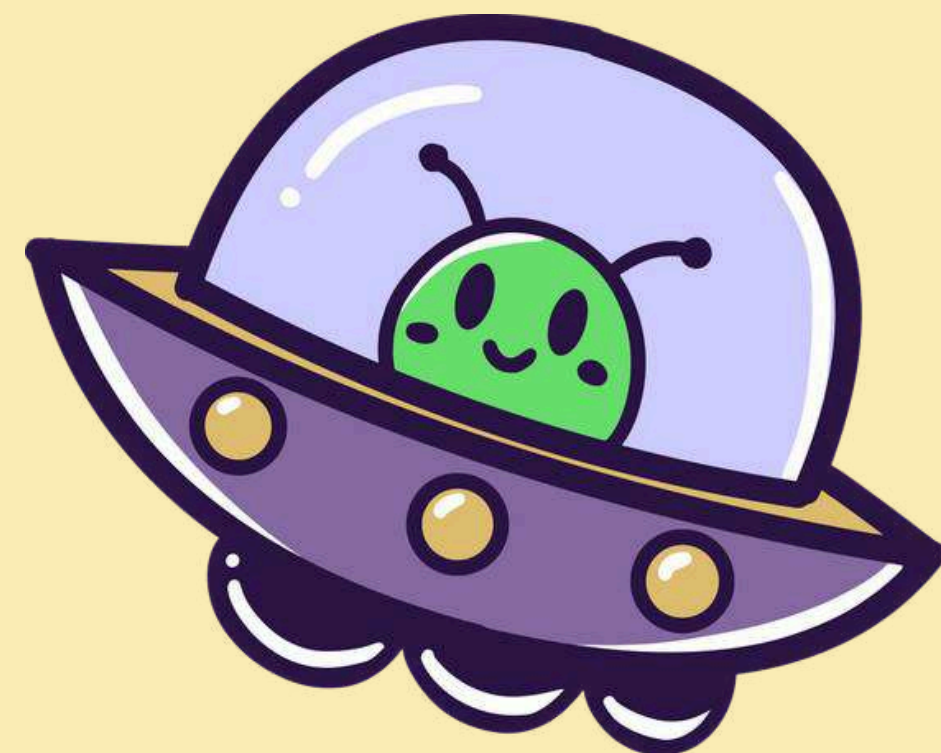
I knew that everything will be fine now.

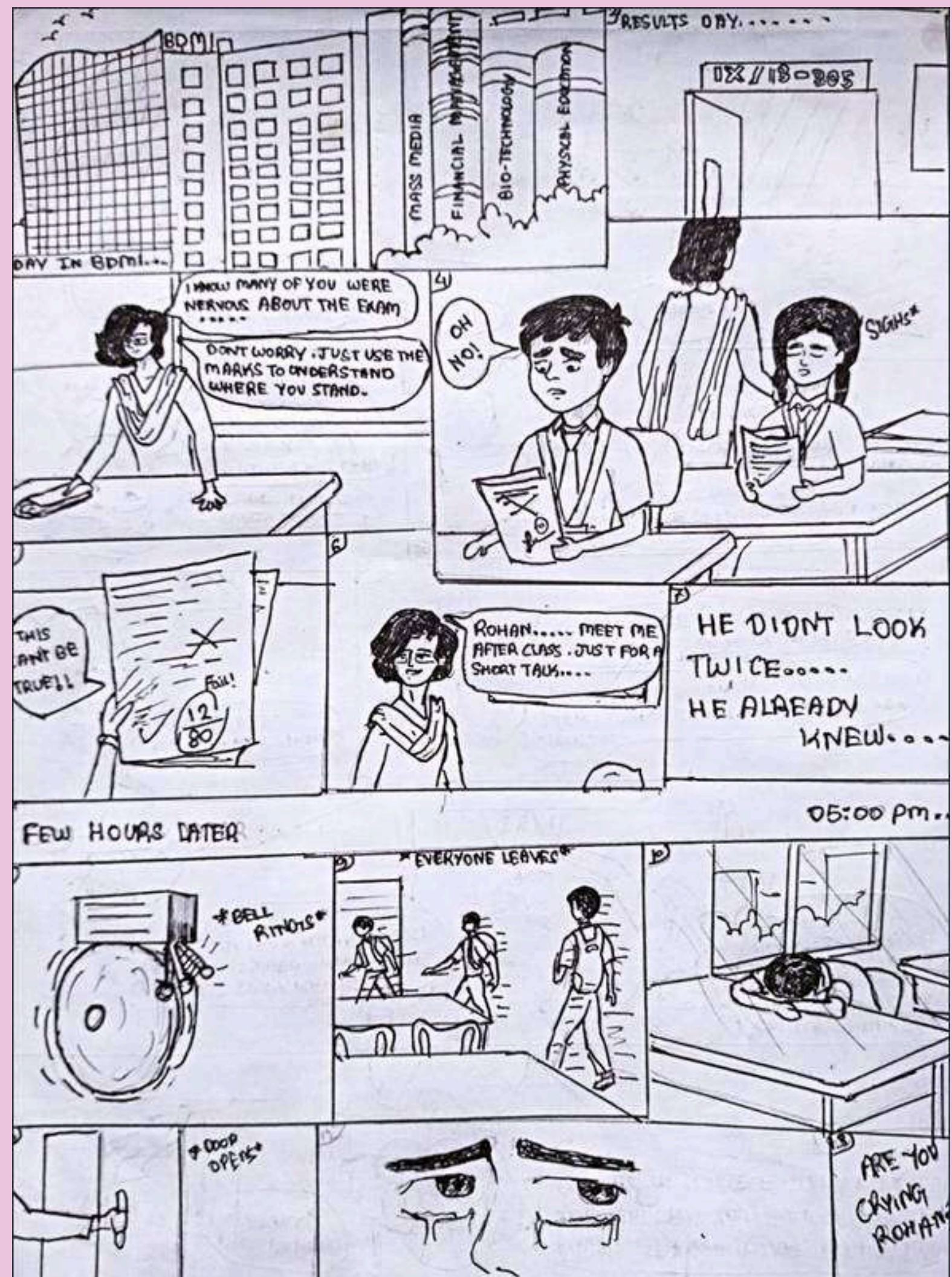
They will T-R-A-V-E-L again. They will D-R-E-A-M again. They will F-E-E-L again.

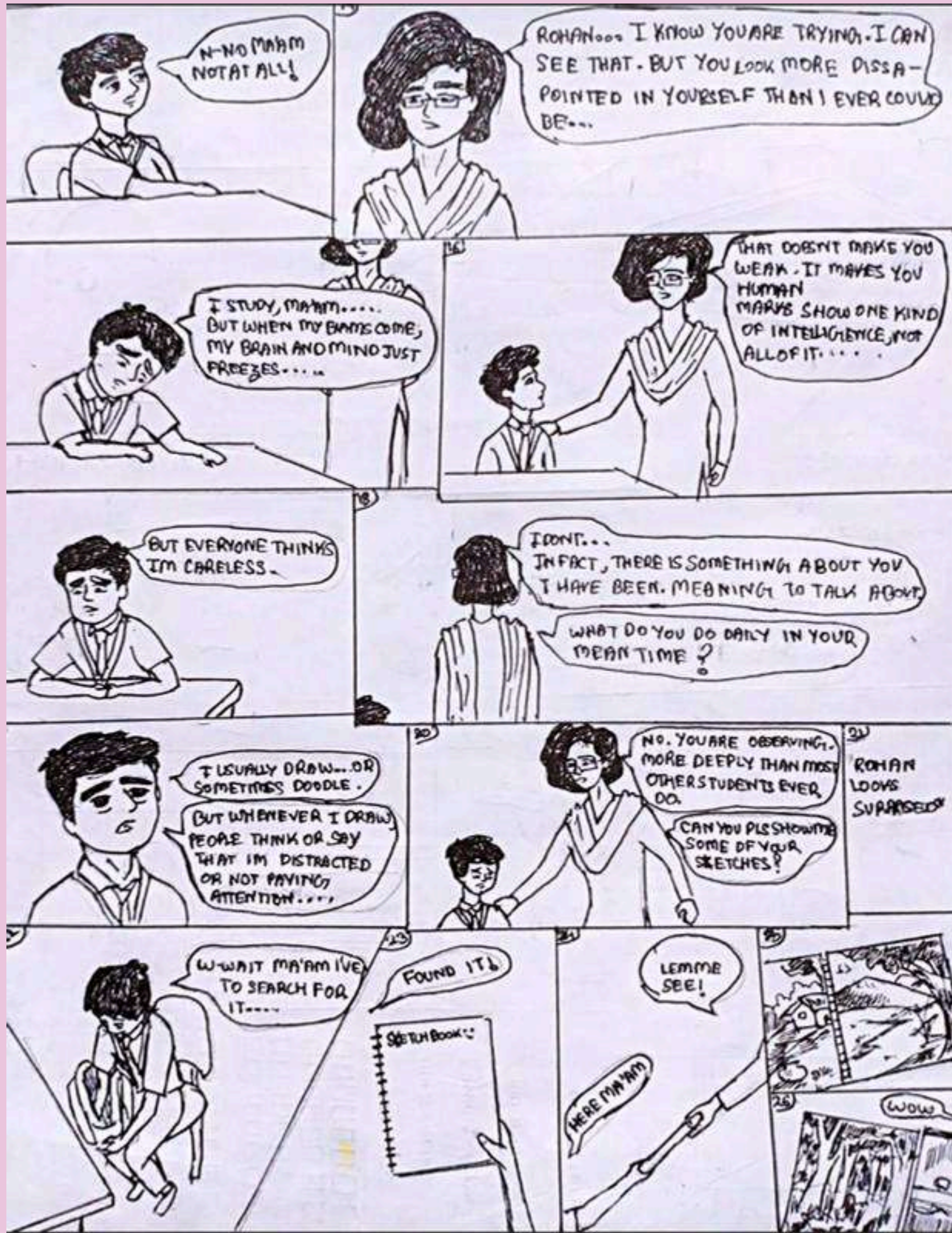
And once they rediscover me—they will never turn back.

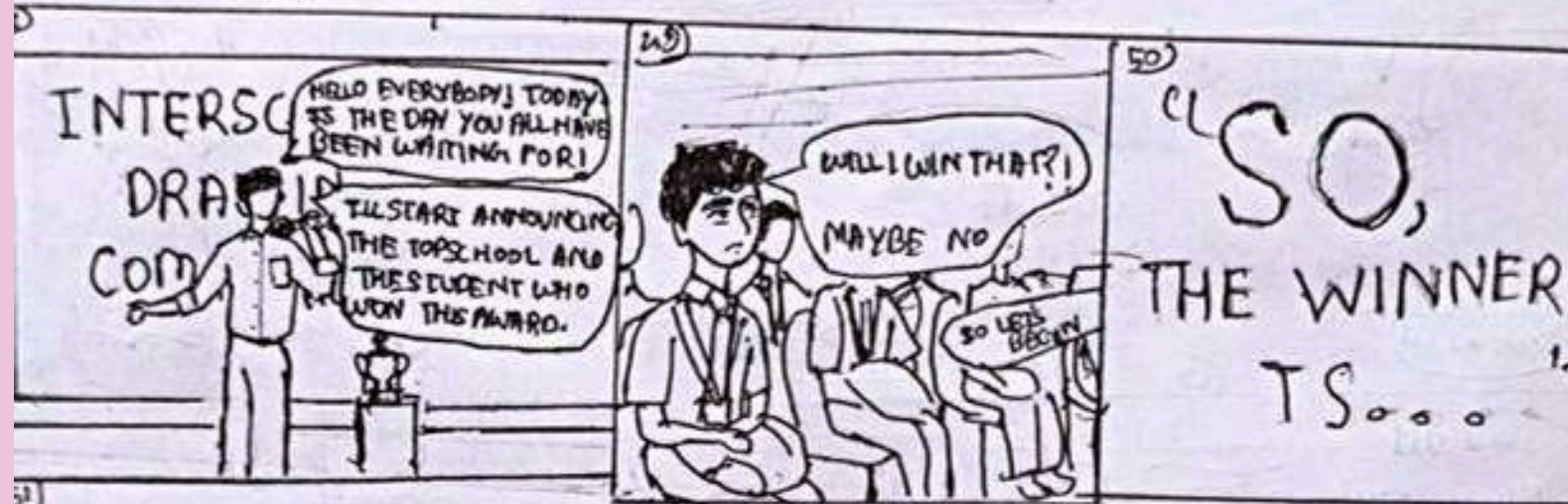
